

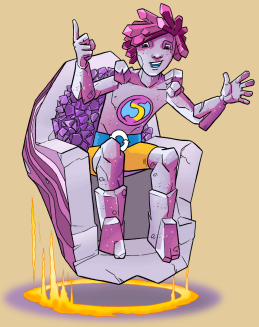


Mining, Drilling, and Minerals in the Amazon
